CAMPUS POLICE

Central Tech believes in providing safe facilities, surroundings and activities for employees, students and employers. Students and employees are encouraged to be responsible for their own security as well as the security of others. In the event of a crime or other emergency, however, prompt and accurate reporting is encouraged by contacting the Campus Director or Assistant Director. S/he will then contact the Campus Police Department, which has full legal authority and also works cooperatively with local law enforcement officials. The Central Tech Campus Police Department is a C.L.E.E.T. recognized police department staffed by C.L.E.E.T. certified peace officers. Any person who threatens the health or safety of students or employees on campus, according to Oklahoma School Law, may be directed to leave the school campus and cannot enter the campus for six months after that time without permission of the Campus Director.

DISCLOSURE OF REPORTING

Central Tech officials shall make available to victims of crimes reported on campus the results of any disciplinary action taken against the perpetrator of the crime. Central Tech does allow for victims or witnesses to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis to Campus Director/Assistant Director/Campus Police.

TIMELY WARNING PROCEDURES

In the event of an immediate threat to persons or property of students or employees on the Central Tech campus, either reported to the Campus Police or considered by Central Tech administration to represent a serious or continued threat to students or employees, a warning will be issued through the electronic notification system.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES

Central Tech follows NIMS guidelines and the Incident Command System when responding to emergencies. Detailed Functional Protocols and Incident Specific Procedures are maintained as a part of the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). EOP is reviewed at least annually by the Safety Committee and updated a necessary.

Students enrolled in full-time programs receive information about campus security procedures in the Student Handbook. Additionally, students participate in emergency response training drills as specified by Oklahoma School law each semester including: 1) intruder drills, 2) lockdown drills, 3) fire drills, 4) severe weather drills, and 5) a drill to be determined by the Emergency Operations Planning Team based on need.

Should an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occur on the Central Tech campus, the superintendent or his/her designee, will declare an emergency. The administration will take into account the safety of the campus, determine the information to release about the situation and begin the notification process once the emergency is declared.

CAMPUS SECURITY

To maintain a safe environment for students, all doors except the main entrance will be locked at the Drumright campus. Students may enter the south door 30 minutes prior to the beginning of class. At all other times, the main entrance door must be used. Surveillance cameras are in place inside and outside the building at both the Drumright and Sapulpa campuses.

An all-school professional development is conducted on an annual basis at the beginning of the school year to inform employees about campus security procedures and practices, and to encourage employees to be responsible for their own security and the security of others. Students are informed about crime prevention during student orientation.

DANGEROUS WEAPONS

The possession or use of dangerous weapons while a student is in attendance at Central Tech, at any function authorized by the school, or while in transit to or from Central Tech on school transportation, is expressly prohibited.

Oklahoma Statutes, Title 21, Section 1280.1 prohibits any person, except a peace officer or other person authorized by the board of education of the district, to have in such person's possession on any public or private school property or while in any school bus or vehicle used by any school for transportation of students or teachers any weapon as defined in Section 1272 below:

"...any pistol; revolver; shotgun or rifle whether loaded or unloaded; or any blackjack; loaded cane; billy; hand chain; metal knuckles; or any other offensive weapon."

Central Tech Administration will determine what constitutes a weapon. Any student who violates this policy will be subject to discipline which may include suspension up to one full calendar year (for firearms) or for any term less than one calendar year (for weapons other than firearms) as determined by the administration. Such weapon will be confiscated and released only to law enforcement authorities.

GUN-FREE SCHOOLS

It is the policy of this school district to comply fully with the Gun-Free School Act.

Any student in this school district who uses or possesses a firearm at school, at any school-sponsored event, or in or upon any school property, including school transportation or school-sponsored transportation, may be removed from school for not less than one full calendar year. Such firearm will be confiscated and released only to a law enforcement authority.

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION AND BULLYING

The School Safety and Bullying Prevention Act defines the term "bullying" as including, but not limited to a pattern of harassment, intimidation, threatening behavior, physical acts, verbal or electronic communication directed toward a student or group of students that results in or is reasonably perceived as being done with the intent to cause negative educational or physical results for the targeted individual or group and is communicated in such a way as to disrupt or interfere with the school's educational mission or the education of any student that a reasonable person should recognize will: harm another student, damage another student's property, place another student in reasonable fear of harm to the student's person or damage to the student's property; or insult or demean any student or group of students in such a way as to disrupt or interfere with the school's educational mission or the education of any student. The prevention of and education about harassment, intimidation and bullying to Central Tech students will be addressed on a yearly basis. Anyone alleging bullying, harassment or intimidation have occurred should contact the Assistant Campus Director. As much written detailed information as possible should be provided. Board policy is available at centraltech.edu or upon request.

MONITORING OFF CAMPUS CRIMINAL ACTIVITY

Central Tech has no identified off-campus student locations related to student organizations or off-campus student housing. Central Tech does not actively monitor criminal activity involving students that occurs off campus. However, if information is brought to the attention of Central Tech personnel, then appropriate action will be taken in accordance with Central Tech's Student Handbook.

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS POLICIES

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

No student will use, possess or distribute illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia, or non-intoxicating beverages as defined in Section 163.2 of Title 37 of the Oklahoma Statutes, alcoholic beverages or any mind-altering substance deemed to be inappropriate to school while on school property or while participating in school activities away from campus.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

An offense of any of the above listed standards of conduct can result in short- or long-term suspension. Short-term suspension is removal from school for up to 10 days. Long-term suspension is removal from school for more than 10 days up to the remainder of the current semester plus the next semester or up to one full calendar year. Involvement of law enforcement is also an option.

CAMPUS SEARCHES

To discourage the use and transportation of any unlawful substances, the Board of Education has authorized searches of campus facilities by a trained dog and handler. Searches may be conducted at any time, without notice. Searches may include classrooms, lockers, shops, and any other school property or students' possessions. Searches may also include student parking lots. All vehicles driven by students on to school property, whether or not owned by said student, will be subject to a search.

In the event that the dog "alerts" to indicate that prohibited substances are present, the area will be further searched. Parent(s) and/or guardian(s) of high school students will be notified if prohibited substances are found. Law enforcement officials will be contacted if possession of any unlawful substance is verified (with secondary or post-secondary students). Law enforcement officials will also be contacted if difficulty is encountered with the student(s) in question.

EFFECTS OF DRUGS

Following is information offered to help understand the effects of alcohol and other drugs, thereby discouraging their use:

ALCOHOL (liquor, beer, wine, wine coolers, etc.)

Alcohol consumption causes a number of marked changes in behavior. Even low doses significantly impair the judgment and coordination required to drive a car safely, increasing the likelihood that the driver will be involved in an accident. Low to moderate doses of alcohol also increase the incidence of a variety of aggressive acts, including spouse and child abuse. Moderate

to high doses of alcohol cause marked impairments in higher mental functions, severely altering a person's ability to learn and remember information. Very high doses cause respiratory depression and death. If combined with other depressants of the central nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just described.

COCAINE

Cocaine stimulates the central nervous system. Its immediate effects include dilated pupils and elevated blood pressure, heart rate, respiratory rate, and body temperature. Occasional use can cause a stuffy or runny nose, while chronic use can ulcerate the mucous membrane of the nose. Injecting cocaine with contaminated equipment can cause AIDS, hepatitis, and other diseases. Preparation of freebase, which involves the use of volatile solvents, can result in death or injury from fire or explosion. Cocaine can produce psychological and physical dependency, a feeling the user cannot function without the drug. In addition, tolerance develops rapidly. The use of cocaine can cause death by cardiac arrest or respiratory failure.

INHALANTS (aerosol sprays, glues, solvents, compressed air, etc.)

The immediate negative effects of inhalants include nausea, sneezing, coughing, nosebleeds, fatigue, lack of coordination, and loss of appetite. Solvents/aerosol sprays also decrease the heart and respiratory rates and impair judgment. Amyl and butyl nitrite cause rapid pulse, headaches, and involuntary passing of urine and feces. Long-term use may result in hepatitis or brain damage.

Deeply inhaling the vapors, or using large amounts over a short time, may result in disorientation, violent behavior, unconsciousness or death. High concentrations of inhalants can cause suffocation by displacing the oxygen in the lungs or by depressing the central nervous system to the point that breathing stops.

HALLUCINOGENS (PCP, LSD, mescaline, psilocybin, etc.)

Phencyclidine (PCP) interrupts the functions of the neocortex, the section of the brain that controls the intellect and keeps instincts in check. Because the drug blocks pain receptors, violent PCP episodes may result in self-inflicted injuries.

Chronic users of PCP report persistent memory problems and speech difficulties. Some of these effects may last 6 months to a year following prolonged daily use. Mood disorders -- depression, anxiety, and violent behavior -- also occur. In late stages of chronic use, users often exhibit paranoid and violent behavior and experience hallucinations. Large doses may produce convulsions and coma, as well as heart and lung failure.

Lysergic acid (LSD), mescaline, and psilocybin cause illusions and hallucinations. The physical effects may include dilated pupils, elevated body temperature, increased heart rate and blood pressure, loss of appetite, sleeplessness, and tremors.

Sensations and feelings may change rapidly. It is common to have a bad psychological reaction to LSD, mescaline, and psilocybin. The user may experience panic, confusion, suspicion, anxiety, and loss of control. Delayed effects, or flashbacks, can occur even after use has ceased.

OTHER STIMULANTS (amphetamines, crack, speed, imitation speed, etc.)

Stimulants can cause increased heart and respiratory rates, elevated blood pressure, dilated pupils, and decreased appetite. In addition, users may experience sweating, headache, blurred vision, dizziness, sleeplessness, and anxiety. Extremely high doses can cause a rapid or irregular

heartbeat, tremors, loss of coordination, and even physical collapse. An amphetamine injection creates a sudden increase in blood pressure that can result in stroke, very high fever, or heart failure.

DEPRESSANTS (barbiturates, methaqualone, tranquilizers, etc.)

The effects of depressants are in many ways similar to the effects of alcohol. Small amounts can produce calmness and relaxed muscles, but somewhat larger doses can cause slurred speech, staggering gait, and altered perception. Very large doses can cause respiratory depression, coma, and death. The combination of depressants and alcohol can multiply the effects of the drugs, thereby multiplying the risks.

CANNABIS (marijuana, THC, hashish, synthetic cannabanoids)

All forms of cannabis have negative physical and mental effects. Several regularly observed physical effects of cannabis are a substantial increase in the heart rate, bloodshot eyes, a dry mouth and throat, and increased appetite.

Use of cannabis may impair or reduce short-term memory and comprehension, alter sense of time, and reduce ability to perform tasks requiring concentration and coordination such as driving a car. Research also shows that students do not retain knowledge when they are "high." Motivation and cognition may be altered, making the acquisition of new information difficult. Marijuana can also produce paranoia and psychosis.

NARCOTICS (heroin, codeine, morphine, opium, methadone, etc.)

Narcotics initially produce a feeling of euphoria that is followed by drowsiness, nausea, and vomiting. Users also may experience constricted pupils, watery eyes, and itching. An overdose may produce slow and shallow breathing, clammy skin, convulsions, coma, and possible death.

DESIGNER DRUGS (synthetic heroin, Ecstasy PCRY, new heroin, methamphetamine, etc.)

Illegal drugs are defined in terms of their chemical formulas. To circumvent these legal restrictions, underground chemists modify the molecular structure of certain illegal drugs to produce analogs known as designer drugs. These drugs can be several hundred times stronger than the drugs they are designed to imitate.

Many of the so-called designer drugs are related to amphetamines and have mild stimulant properties but are mostly euphorants. They can produce severe neurochemical damage to the brain.

The narcotic analogs can cause symptoms such as those seen in Parkinson's disease: uncontrollable tremors, drooling, impaired speech, paralysis, and irreversible brain damage. Analogs of amphetamines and methamphetamines cause nausea, blurred vision, chills or sweating, and faintness. Psychological effects include anxiety, depression, and paranoia. As little as one dose can cause brain damage. The analogs of phencyclidine cause illusions, hallucinations, and impaired perception.

COUNSELING, TREATMENT AND REHABILITATION

Although Central Tech does not have drug counseling, treatment or rehabilitation programs on campus, rehabilitative and educational programs are available through local agencies that can be of assistance in this area. Students who recognize that they have a problem are encouraged to

make contact with these agencies or ask counselors for assistance to do so.

FEDERAL PENALTIES AND SANCTIONS FOR ILLEGAL POSSESSION OF A CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE

1st conviction: Up to 1 year imprisonment and fined at least \$1,000 but not more than \$100,000, or both.

After 1 prior drug conviction: At least 15 days in prison, not to exceed 2 years and fined at least \$2,500 but no more than \$250,000, or both.

After 2 or more prior drug convictions: At least 90 days in prison, not to exceed 3 years and fined at least \$5,000 but not more than \$250,000, or both.

Special sentencing provisions for possession of crack cocaine: Mandatory at least 5 years in prison, not to exceed 20 years and fined up to \$250,000, or both.

Forfeiture of personal and real property used to possess or to facilitate possession of a controlled substance if that offense is punishable by more than 1 year imprisonment.

Forfeiture of vehicles, boats, aircraft or any other conveyance used to transport or conceal a controlled substance. Civil fine may be up to \$10,000.

Denial of Federal benefits, such as student loans, grants, contracts, and professional and commercial licenses, up to 1 year for first offense, up to 5 years for a second and subsequent offenses. **Ineligible to receive or purchase a firearm.**

Revocation of certain Federal licenses and benefits, e.g. pilot license, public housing tenancy, etc., are vested within the authorities of individual Federal agencies.

NOTE: These are only Federal penalties and sanctions. Additional State penalties and sanctions may apply.

PROGRAM REVIEW

A review of the Drug Free School and Workplace Prevention Program will be coordinated by committee on a biennial basis to certify the following:

1. To determine its effectiveness and implement changes to the program if they are needed.
2. To ensure that its disciplinary sanctions are consistently enforced.

The review committee will present its findings to the Central Tech Board of Education for consideration and approval. All interested parties are invited to contribute pragmatic changes to the committee for consideration.

VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN'S ACT

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Central Tech takes acts of sexual harassment, which include sexual violence, extremely seriously. The following information provides details on Central Tech's response, resources, and remedies to sexual violence. Sexual harassment and sexual violence are forms of gender discrimination that are not tolerated at Central Tech. Central Tech strongly encourages victims to report all acts of gender discrimination. Additionally, students have the option of filing a formal complaint with Campus Director as well as with the police. Please be aware that even if an individual chooses not to file a formal complaint. Central Tech may take interim measures, such as changing schedules. These measures may be taken to provide safety for the victim in the educational setting. Central Tech does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, qualified disability, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, veterans' status, genetic information or age in its program and activities. Therefore, Central Tech will address all complaints of sexual harassment, including sexual violence, the same, regardless of whether the complainant (person filing the complaint) or respondent (person the complaint is filed against) is of a protected class or sex. Where it is determined that sexual misconduct is more likely than not to have occurred, Central Tech conduct sanctions can include suspension or expulsion. Sexual harassment is any type of unwelcome conduct directed toward a student or employee because of gender or sex. This conduct may include, but is not limited to, inappropriate electronic communication, touching, verbal comments, name calling, spreading sexual rumors, suggestive gestures, suggestive sounds, pressure for sexual activity, or sexual assault, stalking, dating violence, and domestic violence. Incidents of sexual harassment should be reported to an Instructor, Counselor, Campus Director or Assistant Campus Director.

RETALIATION

Central Tech will not tolerate retaliation against a person who, in good faith, brings a complaint forward. Retaliation against an individual who has brought a complaint forward or against an individual who has participated in an investigation or conduct process is prohibited.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE

- A. If you are not safe and need immediate help, call the police. If the incident happened on campus, call the Campus Director/Assistant Campus Director and/or Central Tech Police Department at 918-352-2551. If the incident happened anywhere else, call the law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction in the location where it occurred.
- B. Do what you need to do to feel safe. Go to a safe place or contact someone with whom you are comfortable. You can call the 24-hour Rape Crisis Line (918-744-7273) to get advice and discuss options for how to proceed.
- C. Do not shower, bathe, douche, change or destroy clothes, eat, drink, smoke, chew gum, take any medications or straighten the room or place of the incident. Preserving evidence is critical for criminal prosecution. Although you may not want to prosecute immediately after the incident, that choice will not be available without credible evidence. The evidence collected can also be useful in the campus conduct process.
- D. Go to the Drumright/Sapulpa Medical Center to receive care for any physical injuries that may have occurred. While in the emergency room, treatment will be provided for sexually

transmitted diseases and to prevent pregnancy. These services are free of charge. If you choose not to obtain a Sexual Assault Nurse Examination but want testing or treatment for potential sexually transmitted infections, you can visit Creek County Health Department free of charge.

- E. Upon arrival at Drumright/Sapulpa Medical Center, you will be taken to a private exam area. A Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE), as well as a Sexual Assault Response Advocate (SARA) and police officer will be available for support. You will be examined by the nurse in order to treat any injuries and to gather evidence. Note, a sexual assault exam can be performed up to 120 hours (5 days) after the assault.
- F. With your permission, the Sexual Assault Response Advocate will support you throughout the entire exam, which will be performed by the nurse. The Advocate will provide a packet of written materials that contains information about common reactions to sexual assault, follow-up medical needs and support services.

VICTIM BILL OF RIGHTS

Survivors shall be notified of their options to notify law enforcement and campus authorities, which includes the option not to notify such authorities.

- Accuser and accused must have the same opportunity to have others present.
- Both parties shall be informed of the outcome of any disciplinary proceeding.
- Survivors shall be notified of counseling services.
- Survivors shall be notified of options for changing academic and living situations.

When a student or employee reports that they have been a victim of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, whether on or off campus, the Central Tech will provide a written explanation of the student's or employee's rights and options.

REGISTERED SEX OFFENDER

Central Tech policy requires applicants for admission to report felony convictions or dismissals from another education institution for disciplinary reasons.

Oklahoma School Law Section 1118 – School Safety Zones requires a 500 foot “school safety zone” around high schools. A person who has been convicted of a crime that requires them to register pursuant to the Sex Offender Registration Act is prohibited from loitering inside the “school safety zone” except when they are the custodial parent or legal guardian of a minor who is an enrolled student at the school and the person is enrolling, delivering, or retrieving such child at the school or for school-sanctioned extracurricular activities.

Based on these statutes, Central Tech prohibits registered sex offenders from attending daytime classes on any campus. For night-time adult education classes, enrollment decisions are made on a case-by-case basis.

DEFINITIONS UNDER OKLAHOMA LAW

Consent: The term “consent” means the affirmative, unambiguous and voluntary agreement to engage in a specific sexual activity during a sexual encounter which can be revoked at any time. Consent cannot be:

1. Given by an individual who: • is asleep or is mentally or physically incapacitated either through the effect of drugs or alcohol or for any other reason, or • is under duress, threat, coercion or force; or
2. Inferred under circumstances in which consent is not clear including, but not limited to: • the absence of an individual saying “no” or “stop”, or • the existence of a prior or current relationship or sexual activity. *21 Okla. Stat. § 113 (effective June 6, 2016).*

Dating violence is not defined by the state of Oklahoma; however, violence against a person with whom the perpetrator is in a dating relationship is considered domestic violence, defined below. A dating relationship is defined as: a courtship or engagement relationship. For purposes of this act, a casual acquaintance or ordinary fraternization between persons in a business or social context shall not constitute a dating relationship. *22 Okla. Stat. § 60.1.*

Domestic Violence is referenced in Oklahoma Statute Title 21 Chapter 20 Section 644c as Domestic Abuse. Domestic abuse is defined as: Any person who commits any assault and battery against a current or former spouse, a present spouse of a former spouse, a former spouse of a present spouse, parents, a foster parent, a child, a person otherwise related by blood or marriage, a person with whom the defendant is or was in a dating relationship as defined by Section 60.1 of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes, an individual with whom the defendant has had a child, a person who formerly lived in the same household as the defendant, or a person living in the same household as the defendant shall be guilty of domestic abuse. *21 Okla. Stat. § 644.*

Sexual assault: A. rape, or rape by instrumentation, as defined in Sections 1111, 1111.1 and 1114 of [Title 21], or B. forcible sodomy, as defined in Section 888 of [Title 21]. *21 Okla. Stat. § 142.20.*

Rape (as used in the definition for “sexual assault”):

- A. Rape is an act of sexual intercourse involving vaginal or anal penetration accomplished with a male or female who is not the spouse of the perpetrator and who may be of the same or the opposite sex as the perpetrator under any of the following circumstances:
 1. Where the victim is under sixteen (16) years of age;
 2. Where the victim is incapable through mental illness or any other unsoundness of mind, whether temporary or permanent, of giving legal consent;
 3. Where force or violence is used or threatened, accompanied by apparent power of execution to the victim or to another person;
 4. Where the victim is intoxicated by a narcotic or anesthetic agent, administered by or with the privity of the accused as a means of forcing the victim to submit;
 5. Where the victim is at the time unconscious of the nature of the act and this fact is known to the accused;
 6. Where the victim submits to sexual intercourse under the belief that the person committing the act is a spouse, and this belief is induced by artifice, pretense, or concealment practiced by the accused or by the accused in collusion with the spouse

with intent to induce that belief. In all cases of collusion between the accused and the spouse to accomplish such act, both the spouse and the accused, upon conviction, shall be deemed guilty of rape;

7. Where the victim is under the legal custody or supervision of a state agency, a federal agency, a county, a municipality or a political subdivision and engages in sexual intercourse with a state, federal, county, municipal or political subdivision employee or an employee of a contractor of the state, the federal government, a county, a municipality or a political subdivision that exercises authority over the victim;
 8. Where the victim is at least sixteen (16) years of age and is less than twenty (20) years of age and is a student, or under the legal custody or supervision of any public or private elementary or secondary school, junior high or high school, or public vocational school, and engages in sexual intercourse with a person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older and is an employee of the same school system; or
 9. Where the victim is nineteen (19) years of age or younger and is in the legal custody of a state agency, federal agency or tribal court and engages in sexual intercourse with a foster parent or foster parent applicant.
- B. Rape is an act of sexual intercourse accomplished with a male or female who is the spouse of the perpetrator if force or violence is used or threatened, accompanied by apparent power of execution to the victim or to another person. *21 Okla. Stat. § 1111*

Rape by instrumentation (as used in the definition of “sexual assault”): Rape by instrumentation is an act within or without the bonds of matrimony in which any inanimate object or any part of the human body, not amounting to sexual intercourse is used in the carnal knowledge of another person without his or her consent and penetration of the anus or vagina occurs to that person. Provided, further, that at least one of the circumstances specified in Section 1111 of this title has been met; further, where the victim is at least sixteen (16) years of age and is less than twenty (20) years of age and is a student, or under the legal custody or supervision of any public or private elementary or secondary school, junior high or high school, or public vocational school, and engages in conduct prohibited by this section of law with a person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older and is an employee of the same school system, or where the victim is under the legal custody or supervision of a state or federal agency, county, municipal or a political subdivision and engages in conduct prohibited by this section of law with a federal, state, county, municipal or political subdivision employee or an employee of a contractor of the state, the federal government, a county, a municipality or a political subdivision that exercises authority over the victim, consent shall not be an element of the crime. Provided, further, that at least one of the circumstances described in Section 1111 of this title has been met; further, where the victim is nineteen (19) years of age or younger and in the legal custody of a state agency, federal agency or tribal court and engages in conduct prohibited by this section of law with a foster parent or foster parent applicant. Except for persons sentenced to life or life without parole, any person sentenced to imprisonment for two (2) years or more for a violation of this section shall be required to serve a term of post-imprisonment supervision pursuant to subparagraph f of paragraph 1 of subsection A of Section 991a of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes under conditions determined by the Department of Corrections. The jury shall be advised that the mandatory post-imprisonment supervision shall be in addition to the actual imprisonment. *21 Okla. Stat. § 1111.1.*

Forcible sodomy (as used in the definition of “sexual assault”):

- A. Any person who forces another person to engage in the detestable and abominable crime against nature, pursuant to Section 886 of this title, upon conviction, is guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for a period of not more than twenty (20) years. Except for persons sentenced to life or life without parole, any person sentenced to imprisonment for two (2) years or more for a violation of this subsection shall be required to serve a term of post-imprisonment supervision pursuant to subparagraph f of paragraph 1 of subsection A of Section 991a of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes under conditions determined by the Department of Corrections. The jury shall be advised that the mandatory post-imprisonment supervision shall be in addition to the actual imprisonment. Any person convicted of a second violation of this section, where the victim of the second offense is a person under sixteen (16) years of age, shall not be eligible for probation, suspended or deferred sentence. Any person convicted of a third or subsequent violation of this section, where the victim of the third or subsequent offense is a person under sixteen (16) years of age, shall be punished by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for a term of life or life without parole, in the discretion of the jury, or in case the jury fails or refuses to fix punishment then the same shall be pronounced by the court. Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection after having been twice convicted of a violation of subsection A of Section 1114 of this title, a violation of Section 1123 of this title or sexual abuse of a child pursuant to Section 843.5 of this title, or of any attempt to commit any of these offenses or any combination of said offenses, shall be punished by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for a term of life or life without parole.
- B. The crime of forcible sodomy shall include:
1. Sodomy committed by a person over eighteen (18) years of age upon a person under sixteen (16) years of age;
 2. Sodomy committed upon a person incapable through mental illness or any unsoundness of mind of giving legal consent regardless of the age of the person committing the crime;
 3. Sodomy accomplished with any person by means of force, violence, or threats of force or violence accompanied by apparent power of execution regardless of the age of the victim or the person committing the crime;
 4. Sodomy committed by a state, county, municipal or political subdivision employee or a contractor or an employee of a contractor of the state, a county, a municipality or political subdivision of this state upon a person who is under the legal custody, supervision or authority of a state agency, a county, a municipality or a political subdivision of this state;
 5. Sodomy committed upon a person who is at least sixteen (16) years of age but less than twenty (20) years of age and is a student of any public or private secondary school, junior high or high school, or public vocational school, with a person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older and is employed by the same school system;
 6. Sodomy committed upon a person who is at the time unconscious of the nature of the act, and this fact should be known to the accused; or
 7. Sodomy committed upon a person where the person is intoxicated by a narcotic or anesthetic agent administered by or with the privity of the accused as a means of forcing the person to submit. *21 Okla. Stat. § 888 (effective June 6, 2016).*

Stalking: Any person who willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly follows or harasses another person in a manner that:

- A. Would cause a reasonable person or a member of the immediate family of that person as defined in subsection F of this section to feel frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed, or molested; and
- B. Actually causes the person being followed or harassed to feel terrorized, frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed, or molested, shall, upon conviction, be guilty of the crime of stalking, which is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than one (1) year or by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), or by both such fine and imprisonment for purposes of this section:
 1. “Harasses” means a pattern or course of conduct directed toward another individual that includes, but is not limited to, repeated or continuing unconsented contact, that would cause a reasonable person to suffer emotional distress, and that actually causes emotional distress to the victim. Harassment shall include harassing or obscene phone calls as prohibited by Section 1172 of this title and conduct prohibited by Section 850 of this title. Harassment does not include constitutionally protected activity or conduct that serves a legitimate purpose;
 2. “Course of conduct” means a pattern of conduct composed of a series of two or more separate acts over a period of time, however short, evidencing a continuity of purpose. Constitutionally protected activity is not included within the meaning of “course of conduct”;
 3. “Emotional distress” means significant mental suffering or distress that may, but does not necessarily require, medical or other professional treatment or counseling;
 4. “Unconsented contact” means any contact with another individual that is initiated or continued without the consent of the individual, or in disregard of that individual’s expressed desire that the contact be avoided or discontinued. Constitutionally protected activity is not included within the meaning of unconsented contact. Unconsented contact includes but is not limited to any of the following:
 - a. following or appearing within the sight of that individual,
 - b. approaching or confronting that individual in a public place or on private property,
 - c. appearing at the workplace or residence of that individual,
 - d. entering onto or remaining on property owned, leased, or occupied by that individual,
 - e. contacting that individual by telephone,
 - f. sending mail or electronic communications to that individual, and
 - g. placing an object on, or delivering an object to, property owned, leased, or occupied by that individual; and “Member of the immediate family”, for the purposes of this section, means any spouse, parent, child, person related within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity or any other person who regularly resides in the household or who regularly resided in the household within the prior six (6) months. *21 Okla. Stat. § 1173.*
